India-Pakistan Partition

Redrawing political boundaries often leads to conflict, especially when the borders are created by an outside party. The partition of India and Pakistan is a really important historical example of how the creation of boundaries can lead to conflict and population displacement and/or resettlements.

Step 2: Viewing Personal Accounts


Click on the link to the 1947 Partition Archive.

Click on the Orange "Migrated From" Dot on the right if it's not already highlighted.



Then either click on the + sign to zoom in or double click on India. The orange dots you see in the screenshot below left will show up. Next, if you click on those orange dots, it will zoom in further. Continue to zoom in until you click on an orange dot and the migration trajectory (black arrows) and stories show up (orange box) like in the screenshot below right.
